WORKING WITH CHILDREN TO BUILD A HOPEFUL WORLD

As I introduce you to this year's annual report, I have to state the hard truth that more children than ever before in history are living in or fleeing from war today, facing imminent danger and massive infringements of their fundamental rights. Over 400 million children are living in actual war zones. That's one out of every six children on earth! The news is even worse if we consider all forms of violence: 50% of the children in our world — one billion vulnerable, growing human beings in need of tender care and support — are instead suffering from some sort of violence.

The work to create safe and inclusive spaces for shared action to promote children's rights and wellbeing has never been more important.

We must meet the ethical imperative to encourage individuals and organizations to join together in action to ensure that all girls and boys can grow up safe and sound, develop to their fullest potential, and be inspired and empowered to work with others to make a difference in their communities.

It was almost 25 years ago, in the year 2000, that Arigatou International inaugurated the Global Network of Religions for Children (GNRC) with a strong faith in the power of everyday people, taking action at the grassroots level, to transform entire communities. The most powerful impact of our work always comes from the local, grassroots level.

I am happy to report that last year alone the GNRC directly engaged 43,030 people in collaborative action for and with children — transforming communities, building resilience, and, step by step, building a peaceful, hopeful world for children.

Next year, in 2025, the GNRC will celebrate its 25th anniversary. In 2002, Rev. Takeyasu Miyamoto, then president of Arigatou International and the inaugurator of the GNRC, expressed the intention to generate "a silent revolution for children" when speaking on behalf of the GNRC to the Special Session on Children of the United Nations General Assembly. Today, the GNRC has grown into a large, global-scale network. The time has come for the power of the people to make revolutionary changes happen for children.

I would also like to take this opportunity to express my sincere appreciation to everyone who has worked with us over these many years. I also welcome with heartfelt gratitude all those who are newly interested in our work and share our commitment to build a hopeful world for children.

It is my prayer that our shared effort to build a hopeful world with and for children will pave the way to a peaceful world for everyone. Let us all dream together. A world where every child thrives is within our reach. We just have to stretch out our arms, together.

EMPOWERING CHILDREN AS CHANGE-MAKERS

Arigatou International is all for children, but also all with them. Children are at the heart of all we do and how we do it. We work hard to create safe spaces and learning opportunities, free from any form of violence, where children can fully express themselves, participate, engage with people of different cultures and beliefs, and become actively and positively involved in our work and in their communities.

SDGs Academy for Children

Our approaches include the SDGs Academy for Children, a safe space (both physical and virtual) and program for children's participation, learning and action on the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) and the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development in general. The Academy seeks to bring children's participation to the forefront of the effort to achieve the SDGs, while empowering children and the communities surrounding them to ensure sustainable development.



Wear My Shoes Award 2023

This year, the Wear My Shoes Award sought to mobilize children and adults to respond to the climate crisis and its impacts on health, education, poverty, violence, justice, and migration affecting children. The global campaign highlighted the contributions of faith leaders, civil society, and non-profit organizations in advancing the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development and safeguarding children from the adverse effects of climate change. The campaign also supported ongoing multi-faith and multi-stakeholder efforts to ensure that children's rights remain central to environmental decision-making processes.

Fifty-two projects were nominated for the Wear My Shoes Award this year, and five top-place winners were selected, hailing from Colombia, Cameroon, Romania, India, and Seychelles, in that order.











Providing Innovative and Engaging Spaces for Empowering Children

Intercultural Meetups: Creating Meaningful Connections Across Borders

198 children involved, from 14 countries

Intercultural Meetups are a key component of the learning cycle for children participating in our Ethics Education programs. These 90-minute online gatherings allow children to connect with their peers from different countries, providing a platform to share their unique cultures while cultivating an appreciation and understanding of diversity.

Meaningful interfaith and intercultural interactions like this can help children cultivate ethical approaches to social and cultural issues while developing empathy, compassion and care for others.



Turning "Heaps of Rubble and Dust" to HOPE - Syria

On February 6, 2023, devastating earthquakes struck northern and western Syria and southern and central Turkey, causing widespread damage and thousands of fatalities. The GNRC, working with Kids Future, a member of the GNRC, provided aid to affected families in Syria.





Coimbatore Peace Festival 2023 - India

On August 9, 2023, Shanti Ashram, a member of the GNRC in India, worked together with other non-profit organizations and school institutions to organize the 32nd Coimbatore Peace Festival. Under the theme, "Together Let's Stand Up for Peace." 730 children and youth commemorated the 78th Hiroshima Memorial Day, remembering the victims and underlining the need for world peace. Acknowledging the religious and cultural diversity of the city of Coimbatore and the entire Republic of India, they emphasized the importance of unity in diversity.



G20 Africa Regional Interfaith Meeting - Kenya

On September 21, 2023, the GNRC hosted the G20 Africa Regional Interfaith Meeting in Nairobi, bringing together 60 participants from five countries: Comoros, Kenya, Tanzania, Uganda, and Rwanda. The meeting, organized in partnership between Arigatou International – Nairobi and the Interfaith Alliance for Safer Communities (IAFSC), convened senior Christian, Sikh, and Muslim faith leaders, representatives from faith-based organizations, government officials, media figures, representatives of civil society, and scholars to discuss and make recommendations for action on issues affecting vulnerable communities across Africa.

Advancing the Work of the Alliance for the Protection of Children (APN) in El Salvador, Guatemala, Honduras and Mexico: Ongoing Implementation of the PREVENIR Project

Nine grassroots organizations working with children on the move and those at risk of being recruited by gangs gathered to finalize the Strategic Plan for the Alliance for the Protection of Children, setting the course for the continuing work of the PREVENIR project. Working together on capacity building since 2022, these organizations continue to expand the offer of services available and the number of children and adolescents reached every year.





GNRC Sixth Forum Official Announcement

Arigatou International will convene the Global Network of Religions for Children (GNRC) Sixth Forum from November 19 – 21, 2024. The Forum will be hosted by the Interfaith Alliance for Safer Communities (IAFSC) in Abu Dhabi, United Arab Emirates. It will bring together children, youth, religious leaders, policymakers, governmental, intergovernmental, and multilateral organizations, and grassroots child rights workers to discuss and recommend proposals for action on the most critical issues facing children globally.



ETHICS EDUCATION FOR CHILDREN: WORKING TO TRANSFORM EDUCATION



ETHICS EDUCATION FELLOWSHIP DELIVERS POSITIVE TRANSFORMATIONS IN ASIA AND AFRICA

The Ethics Education Fellowship concluded its first phase, bringing about transformative changes in teachers and learners, as well as in formal educational institutions. The Fellowship aims to strengthen global citizenship and help build more inclusive, peaceful societies. Implemented in Bangladesh, Indonesia, Kenya, Mauritius, Nepal, and Seychelles, this groundbreaking work demonstrated the transformative power of ethics education and furthered the cause of learning to live together.

LEARNING TO LIVE TOGETHER: THE CHANGE STARTS WITH US

Since 2008, the Learning to Live Together program has been used by many teachers, educators and youth leaders to foster ethical values and spirituality in children. The program, with a constantly growing worldwide impact, provides tools for empowering children to develop a stronger sense of ethical awareness, global citizenship and respect for people of other cultures.

Since inception, 5,049 facilitators have been trained to deliver the program to children, and more than 447,008 children have participated, across 45 countries. Additionally, 50 trainers have been equipped and certified to train adults to become facilitators. Thanks to the unwavering dedication of our facilitators in the field, in the year under review the program reached 2,217 children in Bosnia and Herzegovina, the Dominican Republic, Ecuador, Guatemala, India, Kenya, Peru and Romania. In addition to this, facilitators in Comoros, El Salvador, Macedonia, South Africa, Tanzania and Turkey integrated Arigatou International's Ethics Education Approach into their activities with children.








Advancing Peace and Resilience Through Education in Africa

We continued to work together with UNESCO IICBA in the development of a national consultation, a capacity-sharing workshop, and a teacher's guide in Burundi, supported by the government of Japan. This initiative has equipped 10,000 teachers and education lecturers to integrate a transformative pedagogy approach into their teaching practices. The program's overarching goal is to equip education ministry offices, teacher training institutes, and universities with the capacity to deliver highquality, inclusive, and relevant peace-building education at both the higher education and school level. Arigatou International's Ethics Education Framework is at the core of this initiative.

 An online course for States and faith-based civil society organizations

In the year under review, Arigatou International and the Interamerican Children's Institute of the Organization of American States (OAS) co-facilitated the second edition of this eightweek online course. The course was attended by 22 State representatives and 24 faith actors from around Latin America. Participants highly valued this support in broadening their understanding of the importance of engagement between States and faith actors, as well as the opportunity to have in-depth reflections on key issues affecting children.

LITTLE BUDDHA: EXPLORING CHILD PROTECTION IN BUDDHIST COMMUNITIES ACROSS SOUTHEAST ASIA – A SCOPING STUDY

Highlights

Finalization and regional launch of Little Buddha: **Exploring Child Protection in Buddhist Communities** across Southeast Asia - A Scoping Study

Objectives:



Explore the current situation of violence against children by conducting a literature review of the five selected countries and addressing what is known about specific Buddhist communities.



Identify promising practices and mechanisms from Buddhist organizations to prevent and respond to violence against children.



Identify strategies and recommendations for Buddhist leaders and members of the Asian Network of Buddhists for Child Protection (ABC) to prevent and respond to all forms of Violence against Children (VAC) in their communities.









ENDING VIOLENCE LAB: PROTECTING CHILDREN FROM HARM

Understanding the importance of empowering local communities to implement sustainable child-focused advocacy, in 2021 Arigatou International's launched the Ending Violence Lab. The Lab supports year-round systematic grassroots' implementation of intergenerational advocacy to prevent violence against children. The implementation is based on the Guide and Toolkit for Advocating for Children's Rights and Well-being: An Interfaith Approach.

The Lab has been implemented in Chile, Ecuador, India, Nepal, Serbia, and Tanzania. To date, the Lab has built the capacity of 971 children and adults, in turn reaching over 24,860 individuals through their local advocacy actions and campaigns. In 2023, the Lab in India focused on preventing gender-based violence by addressing social norms. In Chile, the Lab kept the spotlight on children's participation and leadership in child rights advocacy.

Promoting Peace

The Eastern Africa Regional Peace Programme (RPP) is both a programme and a nested partnership. It is spearheaded by the Norwegian Church Aid (NCA) and six other organizations, including Arigatou International's End Child Poverty initiative. The current reach of RPP covers 12 countries in the East, Great Lakes, and Horn of Africa regions: Burundi, the Democratic Republic of Congo, Djibouti, Ethiopia, Eritrea, Kenya, Rwanda, Sudan, South Sudan, Somalia, Tanzania and Uganda.



Scholarships at Amani Village of Hope, Kenya

The Amani Village of Hope in Siaya County, Kenya provides wholistic care and housing for children affected by poverty and multiple vulnerabilities, including children who have been abandoned or neglected, children living with HIV/AIDS, and orphaned children. More than 120 children currently call this safe space a home. In partnership with Arigatou International, the Amani Village of Hope provides more than 20 scholarships annually to enable children access to primary and secondary school education.

"Seen, Heard, Engaged": The Africa Children Summit 2023


The inaugural Africa Children Summit was a unique space entirely designed for and by children to be "Seen, Heard and Engaged" in an effort to amplify children's participation in societal life and continental policy outcomes. At the summit, children discussed their concerns in areas such as education, climate change, violence against children, online child protection, and health, and proposed possible solutions. Arigatou International Nairobi supported the participation of a delegation of children from Kenya. The summit welcomed policy makers, public officials, representatives of civil society organizations, and parents and caregivers, to listen to and dialogue with the children. Held April 10-12, 2023 in Nairobi, Kenya, it brought together over 400 people from nine countries (Kenya, Mali, Rwanda, Sierra Leone, South Africa, Tanzania, Uganda, Zambia, and Zimbabwe), and had over 400 virtual participants from all over Africa and beyond.





FINANCIAL INFORMATION
